If Vladimir Ashkenazy's interpretation of Shostakovich's sprawling and audacious Fourth Symphony does not quite rank with his Fifth Symphony, one of the best on CD, it nonetheless marginally outshines the two other CD versions I have heard, Rozhdestvensky's eccentric rendition on Melodiya and Järvi's disappointing account on Chandos, if for no other reason than that it steers a clear middle road that allows the music its own voices, although the playing from the Royal Philharmonic strings occasionally falls short of the symphony's demands. And Ashkenazy's commitment seems to flag here and there. The recorded sound is not quite as warm as one has come to expect from London, but it has most of the fullness and realism needed here. My favorite version of the Shostakovich Fourth remains the Ormandy/Philadelphia Orchestra rendition recorded shortly after the composer revived this "lost" opus. It cries out for a CD reissue.

I have heard so many Shostakovich Fifths over the past year or so that it will henceforth take a totally extraordinary interpretation to knock me out of my seat. You Levi and the Atlanta Symphony did not accomplish that feat. If you're looking simply to buy the most recent Shostakovich Fifth, the Levi/Atlanta Symphony version will not disappoint "ou, as the interpretation has no annoying lapses and the sound is quite good (Telarc has a particular way with brass). But if you want the best Shostakovich Fifth, Ashkenazy and Järvi remain the best on CD for the moment. The notes by William C. Baxter are impossibly inane and make the error of stating that the phrase "A Soviet artist's . . . reply to just criticism" was inscribed on the Fifth Symphony's title page. Recent research has revealed that this infamous phrase was probably no more than the composer's nod to a reporter's question. Much the same critique can be made of the Levi/Atlanta Symphony recording of the Ninth Symphony, save that here the solo clarinetist makes a whopping mistake (a sustained Eb instead of an E at measure 42) in the second movement that nobody bothered (or knew enough?) to correct. This type of blunder, bad enough in a concert performance, automatically disqualifies a recording, which immortalizes that blunder, unless the whole interpretation is so mind-bogglingly good as to elicit forgiveness, which is not the case here.

On the other hand, Neeme Järvi and the Scottish National Orchestra continue their excellent track record in their Shostakovich symphony cycle with one of the finest renditions of the Eighth Symphony I have heard. Just for starters, the Scottish National Orchestra plays with a sense of ensemble balance and timbre blending of the quality usually reserved for small chamber groups. With this instrumental fluency for starters, conductor Järvi takes Shostakovich's deeply tragic vision and shapes it in a way that continually makes both musical and emotional sense. Even the symphony's closing bars, which generally do not seem to be consistent in tone with the rest of the symphony, somehow, in Järvi's hands, become a perfect musico-dramatic closing for this epic, five-movement work. Chandos provides its usual warm sonics, and it is this latter quality that would make me choose the Järvi Eighth over the equally fine Shostakovich interpretation on RCA reviewed in Fanfare 13:4.
